We remember them all with respect, honour, and love for all they were asked to give; we remember them with many prayers, praying that those who died are now healed and at a joyous peace; praying too that the leaders of the world will focus on other ways of resolving issues rather than war that causes so much devastation and wasted lives. We remember Jesus was a man of peace, he preached peace, care, and love, but it was too much for those in authority to bear and so he gave his life for it. Peace and non-violence are his words and mission and an essential part of God's kingdom. They surely must be ours.

Kamran has written so powerfully on Remembrance and the importance of looking for other ways of resolving problems and committing ourselves to peace.

This is followed by an article from Myfanwy who reflects on her time as a child when her family hosted Czech and Polish pilots - a warm and sad remembrance.

Also included, is a prayer written by, The Rt Revd Dr Guli Francis Dehqani, Bishop of Chelmsford, asking us all to pray each day for Nazanin Zaghari-Radcliffe and all those imprisoned unjustly; those ways may be found to gain their release and be freed from their long incarceration. Bishop Guli was a child refugee herself, fleeing from Iran after the murder of her brother and threats to her family, so she knows full well the terror that brings.

A prayerful reflection for the Remembrance Sunday 14 Nov 2021- Kamran

Today we are gathered to remember our servicemen and women who laid down their lives during WWI and WW2. We are also remembering the on-going sacrifices of soldiers in recent wars, and our local heroes during the recent pandemic.

Remembrance Sunday is a time to think about the consequences of the wars, especially all those soldiers suffering with life-changing injuries or mental health problems.

It is also a time to think and pray for the grieving families and friends of all soldiers – both in past and present – those having to live with bereavement.

Finally, Remembrance Sunday is an opportunity for us to say thank you to all those who have fought and died for our freedom, but that freedom was never free, it cost them their lives.

This sacrificial act reminds us of the sacrificial death of our Lord. Paul in today's reading (I Corinthians 15:50-58) reminds us how God has given us victory over sin and death through our Lord Jesus Christ, but that victory, that freedom was never free, it cost Jesus his life.

The question we all should be asking to ourselves today is how we as a nation and as Christians should celebrate the Remembrance Sunday?

I feel we can honour the memory of all servicemen and women by committing ourselves to peace, to finding ways to deal with conflict, to manage conflict in such a way that we do not end up fighting.

We are not living in a happy world, there is so much brokenness, hurt and intolerance around us. Many people face conflict and arguments every day. How do we deal with those situations?

A question worth considering today is, "Are we truly peaceful people? Do we seek to win arguments by force and aggression or to resolve them by discussion and compromise?

Remembrance Sunday gives us an opportunity to pause, reflect, think, and pray. It encourages us to examine our own viewpoints and approaches, as well as how we perceive other people's perspectives, even if they are different from our own.

I believe that the best way we can honour the people that we remember on this day is to never give up looking for other ways to resolve differences without resorting to war.

And as we leave today, may we go out with a sense of God's peace in us and knowing that, even in small ways, we may be a peacemaker for our world and for the kingdom of God.

For our reflection, I like to end with the Peace Prayer of Saint Francis

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace:
where there is hatred, let me sow love;
where there is injury, pardon;
where there is doubt, faith;
where there is despair, hope;
where there is darkness, light;
where there is sadness, joy.

O divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love.

For it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.

Amen.

Remembering - Myfanwy

There is a cross in the Westminster Field of Remembrance every year for P.A.F. Flying Officer Jan Domanski, aged 22years. "They shall not grow old"



In 1940 we had billeted with us 2 Czech air force men. One of these had been at the Munich Olympics as a long jumper- which he demonstrated by jumping over our Lilly Pond. These two were keen table tennis players. They showed myself and my sister, Liz, how to play. I was useless but they saw potential in Liz and taught her, even once getting her up to make a foursome. The squadron was soon posted and replaced by a Polish Bear fighter squadron. We were given two young men who became members of the family. One- room with a cup of tea and read the newspaper. He helped Liz with her Latin homework. However, he was young enough to show her how to put a tintack on the chair of an unpopular teacher (and to the shame of our disappointment when it did not work). The other Jan Domanski was more lively and I adored him.

He was very fond of me, and I often wondered whether I reminded him of his little niece or sister left in Poland. I had a Hornby train set fitted up in a spare room. He would come in after night flights to play with it and I would play with it too for a while before retiring. My mother worried that I was bothering him, but he assured her it was his way of relaxing.

Night-after-night we would hear the planes go out and night after night Liz and I would stay awake to count them back. Jan was posted to Newark, but he would stay in touch writing letters to me assuring me that the plastercine dog I had made him as a lucky charm accompanied him on the plane on every flight. He spent a leave with us in the furnished house we rented after the Exeter "Blitz." But he too was killed shortly after.

These two young men became part of the family joining in family jokes and occasions, (and knowing where the cake tin was kept). They called my parents Ma and Pa. We all grieved at their loss and arranged Masses at the local Roman Catholic Church. R.I.P


